Founded in 1938, Basketball New South Wales (BNSW) is the governing body of basketball in the state of New South Wales, Australia. Over the past 7 decades, BNSW has grown from just 4 member Associations at its inception, to 63 Associations today.

Encompassed within these member Associations are approximately 50,000 registered members. In addition to registered players, BNSW's membership is made up of referees, coaches and administrators.

BNSW's active members range in age from as young as 4 years old up to the grand old age of 81.

Basketball NSW member Associations range from Albury on the Victorian border up to Ocean Shores on the Queensland border and as far west as Griffith.

Of the 63 Associations, 14 are within the Metropolitan area.

These metro Associations contain half of BNSW's registered members with the remaining members spread across 49 Country Associations.

## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**



2013 was a year highlighted by highs and lows, the low being the loss of two long term associations and one of the highs being another very successful Hall of Fame Dinner combined with the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Dinner. This function highlights the calibre of people that have been through our ranks and assisted us to be the great organisation that we are today. In has been a difficult year for many people involved with BNSW; however BNSW and our members can be proud of achieving successful outcomes in 2013.

On the financial front BNSW has operated soundly in 2013. The consolidated profit for the year was \$162,069. Our business ventures were profitable and continued to provide additional income to BNSW over the year. Looking forward, we have achieved the outcome of limiting registration fee increases to CPI while our costs are increasing at rates above this.

At grass roots we have seen more people playing the sport and many local Associations needing additional facilities to further grow the sport. The need for additional facilities at a reasonable cost is paramount for the future of the sport and there needs to be stronger and more positive engagement with all levels of government that reflect the need of basketball.

Whilst in 2013 BNSW recorded a 0.23% decrease in registrations this was the back of a major increase the previous year. Congratulations to our members who grew their membership. There were two current incentives offered to Associations, the discount for early payment and the payment in arrears (based on June). It is extremely important that all Associations ensure all members are registered for insurance purposes and to allow the sport to demonstrate to government the growth that is being achieved. In 2013 BNSW announced further incentives to local Associations for growth in registrations.

The participation initiatives commenced in 2012 and continued into 2013, with a growth in these initiatives of 37% over the previous year. These initiatives expose school age children to basketball through increased participation and the Active After Schools Program.

The development of the sport continues with coaching and refereeing programmes being conducted during the year. The number of referee

courses/referee coach courses conducted during the year was 25, along with 9 scoretable courses and 5 workshops. The number of coaching courses conducted during the year was 9 with the number of coaches accredited being 253.

The Country Development Programme continued on from its success in 2012 and ongoing support for these programs have been developed.

The continued development of players, coaches, referees and administrators at the local level is paramount and local Associations should ensure they actively undertake this task.

The elite programme was successful with the development of 1000 players in the elite programs during the year. The development involved individual skills training, camps and tours. The results for BNSW representative teams were:

BNSW referees achieved great results. BNSW sent 27 officials to various Australian National Junior Championships, of these – 11 received gold medal games, 10 received bronze medal games, with the remainder representing BNSW very successfully. NSW gained another FIBA qualified official and with another gaining Scholarship to Australian Sports Commission.

The competitions conducted by BNSW continue to grow with our 10 major competitions having 626 teams competing during 2013. The Country Premier League continued to be a success.

A review of the metropolitan league continued in 2013. BNSW Board Member Val Mann is to be thanked for her efforts in this area.

There have been a number of issues this year that have involved legal matters and in particular, BNSW needs to be appreciative of the efforts of David Reid for his contribution and efforts in improving governance in our sport.

As we look forward to 2014, we will all remember the successful dinner that was held to commemorate BNSW's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the 2nd Hall of Fame Dinner. The night was enjoyed by all that attended.

All the members of BNSW need to work together to achieve growth and continued success for our great sport of basketball.

The staff of BNSW needs to be congratulated on the successful year.

Finally I would like to thank all fellow Board Members at BNSW for their support and effort during the year.

## CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT



2013 was quite a challenging year for many of us in sports. We each had to operate our businesses (be it the State body or Associations or clubs) in a stagnant environment. The Australian economy struggled to get out of third gear over much of 2013, with the main culprit holding it back being the Federal election. Consumers simply weren't prepared to ramp up spending until the election was out of the way, which affected revenues for us all.

Given all of those economic factors, BNSW continued with its "reduce costs where possible" strategies. From a financial perspective, BNSW reported a profit of \$162,069. This was a very pleasing result against a budget of \$80,939. I take this opportunity to publicly thank all of you for helping us to achieve this, and also thank our very hard working staff and very diligent Board members who put in incredibly long hours.

2014 will hopefully be better all around for us. Some positive signs are emerging especially in home construction, which needs to get stronger to support lower unemployment rates. Having said that, the Federal Government has already signaled "budget cuts" and whenever I hear those words I know the politicians mean 'anything else other than hospitals, roads and education". Yes, this is likely to mean they will cut in the area of sport. This will affect us in the grant we receive. By how much, we are yet to discover.

But enough of the gloomy stuff that we cannot control. Let's focus on how well basketball continues to do.

Here are some facts which you can all use when talking to your own politicians or sponsors:

## General

- Basketball is the number two sport globally with 213 countries participating in basketball internationally and with over 450 million players regularly playing the game.
- A global study conducted by Roper Starch Worldwide based on 35,000 interviews, showed that 11% of the world plays basketball.
- The most recent Sweeney Sports research in Australia shows that one in three Australians have an interest in basketball.

- Basketball is played by approximately one million men and women, boys and girls across Australia.
- Throughout Australia's States and Territories, there are:
- 426 local associations;
- 20,000 clubs; and
- 60.000 teams.

## **Participation**

- 1,015,000 grassroots participants;
- 625,000 participants 15 years and over; and
- 390,000 participants under 15 years.
- Basketball is the 2nd highest team participation sport in Australia.
- 9% of Australians aged between 5 and 75 years currently play basketball.
- 42% of participants play basketball weekly.
- 25% of Australians have participated in basketball during their life.
- 5% of Australians provide volunteer support to basketball.
- 27% of Australians consider themselves fans of basketball – while 8% consider themselves 'fanatics'.
- 42,000 primary aged children participate in the Federal Government's Active After Schools basketball program – the 3rd highest participated sports program.

## Children's Participation

- The latest sports participation data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics – released in October 2012 – shows basketball has defied the national trend and continued to grow its already strong participation base among children.
- The Children's Participation in Cultural and Leisure Activities survey collected information on participation in sport, cultural activities and use of technology for children aged between 5 and 14.

## CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT



- Overall, the study found that 42,000 fewer Australian children are playing organised sport than three years ago.
- However, basketball participation for 5 14 year olds jumped from 201,900 in 2009 to 220,200 in 2012 – that's an increase of 7.9%, or 18,000 participants.
- Since the 2006 version of the ABS study, basketball participation among children has grown by almost 44,000 children – that's 25% in six years.
- That growth is even more remarkable when you consider that the same ABS study found nearly all other major participation sports including cricket, swimming, netball, tennis and Australian Rules Football suffered a decline in participation levels within the same timeframe.
- Basketball has always been one of Australia's strongest participation sports – and the latest ABS data cements that.

## **National Teams**

- Australia is currently ranked as the 5th best basketball nation in the world out of 213 nations with international Basketball Federations.
- Our four senior national teams are all within the top ten in the world:
- The Women's National Basketball Team the Opals – is ranked second in the world by FIBA.
- The Men's National Basketball Team the Boomers - is ranked ninth in the world by FIBA.
- The Women's National Wheelchair
   Basketball Team the Gliders is ranked second in the world by the International Wheelchair Basketball Federation (IWBF).
- The Men's National Wheelchair Basketball
   Team the Rollers is ranked second in the world by the IWBF.
- Our junior elite programs are showcasing the talent coming through the ranks. Just this year we've seen: silver for the men and bronze for the women at the World Uni Games; bronze for the Gems at the FIBA U19 Championships and a fourth place finish for

the Emus, and both of our U17 teams qualified for the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

## **Aussie Hoops**

## No School No Play

- Between 2010 and 2012, there were 5

Basketball NSW Coaching and Development Department continued to provide a wide range of development programs, events and opportunities for NSW coaches and athletes in 2013.

The primary focus of the department is to provide development opportunities from junior participation programs to the elite area with the State Junior Representative Teams and National Intensive Training Program (NITP).

### Participation & Broad-Based Development

Basketball NSW continues to understand the importance of bringing new players to the sport and also providing coaching, instruction and development to players as they enter our sport.

In 2013 Basketball NSW engaged in a series of broadbased development programs and specialist camps, designed to provide education to players of all ages, experience and ability. This includes specialist metropolitan and regional development camps, shooting camps and guard camps.

The Metropolitan Development League introduced in 2012 was expanded in 2013 to incorporate the Under 14 boys and girls age group and country players were also invited into the league. The league now consists of 240 player's aged 13 – 17 years and 48 coaches from both metropolitan and country associations.

The suite of Basketball NSW development programs continue to provide development opportunities for athletes and coaches in all regions of the State. To ensure there is appropriate development at the various age levels, Basketball NSW conducts the following programs:

## **Development Tours - Tournaments**

Basketball NSW competes in a number of development competitions around eastern Australia, with a focus on providing athletes and coach's opportunities to play against their peers from other states and regions.

These development events provide a valuable link from our development programs to competitive opportunities and also provide our members with a pathway to state teams and participation at National Junior Championships.

In 2013, Basketball NSW teams competed in the following development programs:

- Australian Country Junior Basketball Cup (ACJBC)
- Pacific Coast Slam (PCS)
- East Coast Challenge (ECC)
- Development League (D-League)

#### National Intensive Training Program (NITP)

The Basketball New South Wales National Intensive Training Program under the direction of head coach Mark Watkins continued to provide development opportunities to elite athletes aged 14-17 years in 2012/2013 through a series of camps and small group sessions. The NITP cycle went from October 2012 to August 2013. The squad included 126 athletes from throughout the state, representing 13 country (Albury, Temora, Nowra, Wollongong, Gosford, Dubbo, Tamworth, Newcastle, Maitland, Coffs Harbour, Tuggerah, Bathurst) and 8 metropolitan associations (Penrith, Norths, Manly, Hills, Bankstown, Sutherland, Comets, Hornsby) with some 28 coaches working in the program as network coaches.

## Coach Development

Development of NITP network coaches was identified as a key area for the 2013 program and initiatives were implemented to ensure our coaching network is gaining development at camps and in other areas. As part of each camp, a series of meetings are held to talk about the technical curriculum and also share information gained from the international stage and flowing down from our national team coaches and the AIS head coaches. Basketball Australia coaching director Mike McHugh also attended selected camps. Literature has also been sent to network coaches regarding the latest coaching techniques and trends impacting basketball internationally.

A lecture was held at each of the NITP camps to discuss areas that the International game is headed and how NSW athletes are best served to continue developing the skills required to compete at the International level.



## Links with Organisations

The New South Wales Institute of Sport provides strong support to the NITP through Head Coach Damian Cotter holding regular meetings with Mark Watkins as well as attending NITP camps and other BNSW development events during the year.

## School Work

Athletes are to maintain a satisfactory level of academic performance & display an appropriate behavioural standard at school (includes submitting all school homework, assignments & reports). If their grades are not up to their parents expectations then they have the option to ask the NITP Head Coach to suspend the athlete from all NITP sessions until the parents are satisfied the athlete is working harder to get their grades to an acceptable level.

## <u>Acknowledgements</u>

The New South Wales NITP continues to receive tremendous support from the Board and senior management of Basketball New South Wales, including the provision of staff & resources to provide a quality development program to NSW athletes and coaches.

It is also important to acknowledge the NSW Basketball Associations that continue to provide support for the program through the provision of courts and facilities, along with the hard working base of volunteer coaches who remain the backbone of the program.

## **Country Visits**

On visits to the country towns where we run NITP workouts with the NITP athletes, we also hold player/coaching clinics to help the players & coaches in those towns understand the concepts of BNSW style of play.

## **NSW Regional Academies of Sport**

Basketball NSW continues to foster a working relationship with the Regional Academies of Sport and has formal links with the Southern, Western and Northern Academies.

The RAS provide valuable development opportunities for Under 15 athletes throughout regional NSW, with Basketball NSW providing some funding support through NSW Country Basketball Committee as well as technical support to the programs.

## **Coach Education and Development**

The ongoing education and development of NSW coaches continues to be a focus for Basketball New South Wales and this is carried out through formal coach education courses (NCAS Level One and Two courses), Association based clinics and regional coaching clinics.

With the support of NSW Country Basketball Committee, Basketball NSW development staff through the country development program engaged in a series of regional coach development clinics and seminars throughout the state and Basketball NSW acknowledges this ongoing support.

Basketball NSW also introduced the "Coach Development Seminars" program, which covered a wide range of coaching topics, along with sports science and athlete management education.

## **Growth of Sport**

## Country Development Program

The inception of the Country Development Program (CDP) has proven to be one of the most valuable activities instigated by Country Basketball in years. Camps were conducted at 8 venues involving 700 players and 50 coaches.

The program has the following objectives;

The event was conducted at Port Macquarie with 144 players, 20 coaches, 20 managers, 16 referees scholarship holders and 4 administrators.

2013 saw another very busy and challenging year with some changes occurring:

Basketball NSW continued to hold Regional Referee Action Days in 2013 to help some of our officials gain better access to up-to-date information without extensive travel. These were held in Newcastle, Lismore, Wagga, and Bathurst.

A main Senior and a main Junior League Referee Action Day were held in 2013. BNSW will continue to develop this Action Day so we can try to encourage a consistent approach to all games.

BNSW was fortunate to have numerous referees selected at Basketball Australia Junior National Championships to officiate medal games, and also a high percentage was again successful in receiving semi-finals. 11 Gold Medal officials' positions and 10 Bronze Medal official positions, a very strong result for NSW! Congratulations to all officials who participated.

Congratulations to Rebecca Keirs who was awarded the ASC Officiating Scholarship for 2013. This is a significant achievement for one of our officials competing against other sports elite officials.

Congratulations to Riannan De La Torre who was awarded her FIBA Badge in 2013. Riannan was the ASC Scholarship holder in 2012 and her progression to the WNBL and then FIBA is a fantastic achievement.

Continuation of Metropolitan Referee Coordinators meetings in 2013, which will continue into 2014. Some Associations have found this a valuable networking opportunity.

A Level 2 Referee Course was held by Basketball NSW, with upgrades of several officials during the 2013 season. More will continue to be evaluated and upgraded early in 2014. A Level 3 Referee Course was held in 2012 and these officials were rostered to practice in 2013 and are being assessed. 4 x Grade 0 Referee Coach Course, 1 x Grade 1 Referee Coaches Course and 1 x Grade 2 Referee Coach Course were held by Basketball NSW in 2013 to assist referee educators at Association and League level. Basketball NSW has been happy to assist as many Associations as possible in order to develop someone to assist their officials at home. BNSW staff also delivered 8 x Level 1

Referee Courses, 10 x Beginner Courses and 1 x Level 2 Referee Course.

Basketball NSW staff visited many Associations (as well as hosting at the BNSW office) to run 5 workshops including conflict management, referee coaching, pre game/preventative officiating in both Metro and Country venues.

The Scoretable Committee in conjunction with BNSW staff continued to produce the Scoretable Brochure, and laminated sheets on the bench for all leagues and tournaments. The brochure was available on the website and was appreciated by many parents.

Country Jamboree continued to see Junior Country Officials receive 24 scholarships to attend both these tournaments.

BNSW Coaching Department introduced the Metro D-League which saw many officials being rostered by BNSW Referees Department and gaining an opportunity for extra coaching and game practice.

The finals weekend saw many scoretable officials receive upgrades from the previous year's courses. BNSW ran  $5 \times \text{Level } 1 \times \text{Coretable courses}$  as well as a  $3 \times \text{Level } 2 \times \text{Courses}$  and  $1 \times \text{Level } 3 \times \text{Courses}$ .

2013 saw 5 new Level 2 upgrades, and a couple of Level 4 upgrades for our Statisticians, and several courses run in metro and regional areas.

Basketball NSW would also like to recognise the efforts of all our Scoretable and Statisticians who regularly work at our elite level in the WNBL and NBL. We are fortunate to have some of the best qualified and trained personnel at these events.

The 2013 Senior League Finals saw an outstanding display of officiating and playing, with Brad Giersch receiving BNSW Referee Of The Year, Sean Myers receiving Championship Referee of the Year, Alex Brockway the SBL referee of the year and Chris Vogelsinger the Youth League Referee of the year. The finals were held at Sutherland and a great job was done by our officials, referees, referee coaches, scoretable and statisticians.

2013 saw the continuation of an on-line rostering system for BNSW for the senior league. Country

Premier League was also entered in via this system. BNSW electronically notifies via SMS all appointments which has helped us inform our officials digitally as per their preference.

John Rearden had the task of ensuring all Senior League games were adequately covered in 2013, and Albert Joseph mentored, rostered and assisted BNSW Referee Coaches on senior league. Thanks to John and Albert for all their hard work

Basketball NSW continued to have the AAGPS (private schools) competition as part of our referee portfolio, under the direction of BNSW. Thank you to all the officials who support this BNSW facilitated program.

BNSW continued with "Country Premier League" in 2013. This saw the best junior teams and officials from regional NSW come together for great basketball. BNSW referee staff attended all CPL rounds and finals to assist with referee education and development for our regional officials.

The Junior Leagues are continuing to develop more with each year. The State Championships in 2013 saw an even mix of country and metropolitan officials, with some new faces stepping up to this level from our CPL . The State Cup also saw a mix of country and metro officials, and all did an outstanding job.





The 2013 Junior League Commissioner was Tim Whealing with the assistance of Steve Nicholls. Both did a great job of co-ordinating the referees for Metro semis and finals, a tough job with the number of games, and limited officials. Tim will continue to visit Metro associations during the season for 2014.

Our regional referee co-ordinators, Rachael Watcham - SJL (a big thank you to our outgoing SJL program Manager – Riannan De La Torre who has taken on a new role), Alison Ross - EJL, Rod Kent & Trevor Wilcox, with assistance from Deb Burghart – NJL and Nathan Smith with assistance from Paul Martensz - WJL stepped up for 2013 and have made progression to further develop their leagues for 2013. ## **TECHNICAL AND OPERATIONS**



#### Constitution

As part of the ongoing review of all of its governance procedures, Basketball NSW (BNSW) commenced a review of its constitution in 2012 which will continue into 2013. This review is supported by the Department of Sport and Recreation (DSR) as part of a wider governance review incorporating several of our policies and By-Laws (mentioned later in this report).

The ongoing review of our member's constitutions has continued throughout 2013 with many Associations reviewing and adopting the new DSR format.

There is a continuing pressure by both DSR and the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) for all of our Associations to review their constitutions. A joint approach in 2013 with the OFT will check to ensure all of our Associations are compliant with the OFT. This is an important part of an Association's accountability to their members, financial information and a knowledge that their Association is operating within the guidelines that govern the operation of incorporated bodies is the first step in having an open and transparent governing body. The OFT highlighted many issues that were slowly worked through with each affected Association during the year. It is pleasing to note that the majority of Associations are now fully compliant with the OFT.

#### Sportsrage

It was pleasing to note that this issue improved slightly during 2013. It appears that teams are judging their performances by the margins that they are beating other teams by; this 'win at any cost' philosophy is damaging the relationships between some of our Associations. There are many Associations that feel impotent in dealing with their coaches once selected and the lack of any overall development plan for players and officials has meant a piece meal approach has been taken in trying to achieve the overall aim of creating a safe enjoyable environment for all participants. Both BNSW and its member Associations have implemented a Zero Tolerance approach to inappropriate behaviour, but there has to be greater co-operation between competing Associations and their team personnel and competition organisers in dealing with conflict situations. BNSW has in place appropriate

mechanisms for team officials through their respective Associations to comment about official behaviour. This is then dealt with on a professional level; there is no need for coaches and their supporters resorting to the level of abuse that was apparent during 2012 and to a lesser degree in 2013.

Debbie Keirs has conducted several seminars on dealing with conflict during 2013 and have been well received by those attending.

The absolute number of officials has increased and Associations should be congratulated for the work that they do in this area but it is still the minority of Associations that have accepted their responsibility in this very important area. The downside of this situation is that the demands on our officials are forever increasing with not only BNSW increasing their demand but also unaffiliated bodies utilising the skills of our Association officials to an increasing level as well.

The "Green Shirt" for Young Referees program continues to develop and show positive results but it requires further commitment by administrators in giving these burgeoning officials all the support we can muster in supporting their development and continued performance in this difficult task. We must all accept the continued viability of our sport requires us to work hard at retaining all participants in our sport, especially those that accept the additional responsibility of officiating at games at all levels. Code of Conduct breaches by Coaches resulted in a number of Behaviour Agreements being signed and in a few cases suspensions were involved.

#### **Tribunals**

The final draft of our reviewed Disciplinary Tribunal By-Laws is with our solicitor for final proofing. Basketball Australia (BA) has only recently introduced a revised set of rules and we are in the process also of ensuring compatibility between the two documents. This has further delayed the presentation of the amended By-Laws to the Board for ratification.

Several Associations have introduced 'sin bin' type scenarios and these work when Association officials are consistent in the application of the rules accompanying such schemes.

It does appear however, that the Associations are finding it increasingly more difficult to staff their disciplinary tribunal panels. The volunteer nature of this activity has put pressure on Associations as there is a growing number of charged persons who are accompanied by legal representation. This puts further pressure on this volunteer base, most are not legally qualified or possess the necessary skills to combat the wily legal professional who on occasions takes over the hearing and treats it like a court room. There are now several Associations who have adopted the BNSW practice of getting guilty persons to sign behaviour agreements as this puts additional pressures on the participant to change their behaviour to ensure that a longer suspension does not result with further infractions of the rules. Inappropriate behaviour is the sole responsibility of the participant who displays such behaviours and these behaviour agreements make it easier for associations to take follow up action outside of the Disciplinary Tribunal rules.

Insurance

Basketball NSW renewed its policies with V Insurance in September, 2013. Additionally, Basketball NSW has again applied and secured exemption for Referees Workers Compensation policy with the NSW Sporting Injuries Committee.

This exemption covers registered Referees, Scoretable, Statisticians and Sports Trainers, and highlights the importance of all participants being registered.

#### **Legislative Changes**

2013 saw changes in the Privacy Act as well as new procedures being adopted for the Working with Children Check – for sport these changes will be introduced on a scheduled basis during 2014.

#### Grants

The Grants process conducted by the DSR continues to undergo change as the new Coalition government makes the changes to its operating structures of government and continues to be very cost conscious.

BNSW continued to receive its funding under its triennial agreement with the DSR, which concludes in June 2013 but was continued as an interim arrangement in 2013 and into 2014. The amount of the grant was \$55,000.

The ITCP continues to attract a grant from the Australian Sports Commission through Basketball Australia; this process is under review by BA.

Players with an Intellectual Disability continued to gain support from the DSR.

<u>The BNSW & GSI Basketball Stadium Electricity Cost</u> <u>Saving & Energy Efficiency Joint Venture Initiative</u>

This innovative and ground breaking program continued very successfully in 2013. Rapidly increasing energy prices, particularly electricity, are an ongoing major concern for Basketball NSW and our Member Associations. With this very much in mind, the

Basketball NSW joint project with Global Sustainability Initiatives (GSI) gives our Member Associations and Stadiums the opportunity to access huge savings on their energy costs (mainly electricity for our facilities) through installing hi-tech energy efficient lighting. BNSW arranged a program with GSI that allowed stadiums to be checked then monitored to determine energy use and potential saving, as well as developing a plan to install energy efficient new lighting systems. The great thing is that the Association is put in a position where they have the actual realtime data to be able to make a judgement about the value and cost-effectiveness of installing the new energy efficient lighting system. In many cases there is an additional win-win, with the energy efficient lights producing better quality on-court lighting as well, at a cheaper energy cost, with a reduced carbon footprint! Additionally, GSI has been able to put together some innovative funding packages, where the loan repayments for the lighting installation costs can be covered by the savings in the electricity bills.

GSI works closely within the energy efficiency and renewable markets and is very experienced within this field and is constantly evaluating new technology advances as they come to market. It specialises in developing sensible, practical cost-effective packages that make commercial sense. This approach is of course very important to basketball Associations and stadium management boards. GSI is presently looking at areas other than court lighting where savings can be made, such as general facility lighting and hot water energy requirements.

GSI is constantly reviewing and evaluating the business case for various new technologies and the future may well see on-site generation of clean energy become a more viable option for stadiums. It is hoped that changes to some of the energy efficiency subsidy programs will not prevent the program continuing with new offerings in 2014. We will await those further developments.

#### **Member Association Services**

As well as the wide range of basketball and Association related services provided by Basketball NSW for Member Associations, there are some additional programs that member Associations can

access. The BNSW & GSI Basketball Stadium Electricity Cost Saving & Energy Efficiency Program was explained earlier and can be of great benefit to Associations, particularly those managing their home stadiums. The current Basketball NSW relationship agreement with Coca-Cola will be continued in 2014. The agreement gives Associations that are part of the BNSW program access to a special price list, a rebate on sales and a very attractive incentives program that can provide Associations with a variety of support material for their canteens and fundraising. #### **Commercial Activities**

It is pleasing to be able to once again report in 2013 that the commercial commitment made by Basketball NSW some years ago through its very minimal investments as a shareholder in the starting up of Horizons Sporting Events and IFMG continues to prove its worth. Whilst these are independent businesses, Basketball NSW has benefited from their success through dividends, which are paid to Basketball NSW as a shareholder. This alternative to registration fees as a supplementary source of revenue is very beneficial for Basketball NSW, providing an additional income stream that helps to give some mitigation of the ongoing pressure for registration fee increases. Both Basketball NSW and our member Associations have all experienced cost pressures in 2012-13, as our operating costs and overheads, such as utility costs, rent, transport, accommodation, wages etc continue to move upwards in line with increases in the community generally - but in many cases, such as energy, at considerably more than the rate of the current general CPI.

Basketball NSW remained the major shareholder in Horizons Sporting Events during 2013, with the company continuing to operate successfully in the sports tours industry. Basketball NSW looks forward to continuing this valuable relationship with Horizons Sporting Events and IFMG in 2014.

# **MEMBER PROTECTION**



2013 continued the trend commenced in 2010, as part of its governance program, Basketball NSW (BNSW) has assisted Associations reviewing their constitutions. BNSW assisted Associations by seeking advice when required and providing on ground support at EGM's and AGM's. Basketball NSW has also provided an amended copy of the Draft Association Constitution document prepared by the Department of Sport and Recreation that is more relevant to the basketball environment. The ongoing need for all to be seen as open and transparent in their dealings with their members, Associations have to have in place appropriate mechanisms to ensure that they can deal with issues as they arise. A report received from the Office of Fair Trading on the status of whether or not our Associations were compliant was received during the year and it was disappointing to see the number of Associations that were not compliant and had several years of returns outstanding. With the help of the OFT and Association managements a majority of those that were non compliant are now compliant.

The provision of the 'Safe Coaching' dialogue to Association coaches has had a positive effect for both BNSW and Associations and the greater number of requests by Associations for the session indicates that they are viewing this aspect of their operations as being at risk. This process is adapted to Association needs and preferred format. These discussions about safe coaching practices and the related child protection issues is also seen as a step in improving the relationships between parents, players and their respective Associations. There are still situations that are being highlighted where coaches, in particular, are placing themselves in a position of harm.

2013 ended up being relatively the same as previous years in that, there was an increase of reports across all aspects of our game. These reports covered instances of inappropriate behaviour, inappropriate use of social media, issues covered by the 'Game Report' (this is where coaches get the opportunity to formally report on the performance of the officials of their games and is submitted through their Association), zero tolerance reports and other member protection type comments. These reports resulted in Associations having to deal with more local issues as well as BNSW having to deal with issues

across all our leagues. Associations have accepted the need, as part of their governance processes, to have an internal mechanism to deal with these issues as they arise. BNSW was required to assist with some of these issues. Through Basketball NSW's discussion processes it is apparent that the majority of people spoken to during the talks mentioned above there is a ready acceptance that the approach is appropriate and regarded as an important plank in delivering a better outcome for our younger players. It appears that this initiative has been accepted by the wider basketball community. The physical presence of BNSW Staff at events, the greater acceptance on the part of Associations of the role that they need to adopt in assisting venue hosts to control instances of inappropriate behaviour is pleasing to see but we need to continue to work at getting better at this very important aspect of our activity. Again it further highlights that co-operation gives a better outcome and the enjoyment levels by all, will increase. It was decided that discussion about the court supervision role needed to be conducted and this would be put in the calendar for early 2014.

Bullying has continued to be an issue that Associations appear to be well aware of and taking steps to try and alleviate or minimise its effects on its participants. The 'Safe Coaching' session has been amended to include specific ways of assisting coaches and Associations to determine if bullying is happening within their team structures. The role of social media, especially the instantaneous nature of cyber communications has meant that avenues are now open for bullying to occur on a more frequent basis and without face to face contact. BNSW's role as an educator and the provider of advice became even more apparent, additionally it became apparent that the majority of Associations are now able to deal with most issues themselves and have nearly all adopted social media policies that assists them in dealing with situations where inappropriate comments are made and could be construed as bringing the Association or its members into disrepute.

Risk audits of venues are becoming more and more important. Insurers do not want to be exposed to risky operations, so there will be a push in the future for Associations to become more aware of the areas in which they are placing themselves at risk. Basketball

# **MEMBER PROTECTION**



NSW has focused on this issue throughout the year and will continue in 2014. Several PowerPoint presentations have been developed to assist Associations in recognising the need to change the previously narrow view on risk away from just injuries to the wider area that issues involving 'duty of care' now encompass. It is understood that all risk cannot be eliminated, but good risk management practices can minimise it greatly. In 2014 this will be further discussed as new guidelines have been received from the DSR on risk audits. Many enquiries about these issues are being raised, not only with local Associations but with BNSW and relevant government bodies. There have been many questions by parents direct to BNSW and it is hard to determine whether this is just frustration or an indicator that complaint and review mechanisms in some Associations need to be improved. Associations are informed of queries raised and in some instances; Associations will have to accept that their procedures have to be timely, open and transparent.

Governance, and its related issues, remains a risk that we have to work hard at maintaining the highest possible standards as possible. A power point presentation was presented to a group of Associations as part of the new Country Development Program and was well received. This program is seeking to give this type of education to help Associations' boards understand their responsibilities in this area. BNSW can now adapt this presentation to cover specific Association requests.

Governance will become more and more important as an issue and BNSW will continue its role in seeking and providing timely advice on issues.

The issue of players participating without being registered, particularly those that play representative basketball or participate in development opportunities creates a risk for both BNSW and its Members. Allowing unregistered players to play poses a great risk to Associations and to Basketball NSW and has to be a continued focus in 2014.

#### **AUDIT**

BNSW's Audit has a greater reliance on information gleaned from our information sources. With the work being done on retention and growth patterns, the Audit function will shift more to a compliance type checks. Retention and growth analysis profiles are being developed across the state and these profiles form a handy part to our audit process and when combined with census and data gleaned from both state and local sources, more specific questions can now be focused at Associations in relation to these issues

The employment of a Country Association Liaison Manager will put an emphasis on this area during 2014 for country Associations but will also assist Associations in all areas of governance.

2013 has seen a 0.23% decrease in registration and participation from the 2012 year as at the 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2014, this is as yet not final with registrations still being received by Basketball NSW for the 2013 period and with the expectation that even more will come into the office.

Country Associations have decreased by .30% with four Associations having ceased operation but gaining two new Associations. 31 of the 63 Associations showed positive growth. Four Associations were under 50% registered.

Metropolitan Associations decreased by .51% in numbers, 12 of the 19 Associations showed positive growth. Two Associations lost in the year with one new Association.

The senior category saw the biggest decrease in numbers with 1207 members a 6.04% decrease with males down 4.46% and females down 9.50%.

Juniors and Miniball increased in 2013 with the Junior Category increasing by 670 members a 4.04% increase from 2012 whilst the Miniball category increased by 545 member from the previous year a 6.15% increase.

The "Other" Category saw an 11.38% increase with the gain of 100 members, a better response from the member Associations but more needs to be done at Association level so as to get better numbers for grants etc.

There was a decrease in the Aussie Hoops (Under 8 members) down 1.51% a decrease of 37 members with males up .56% and females down 5.50%.

Other Participation (Learn to play and Special Needs) decreased by 188 members a 7.26% decrease on the previous year.

All Associations are urged to ensure that their hard working Administrators, Coaches and Managers are covered by getting them to register, the huge drop in this category shows that Basketball NSW are keen to get these members covered, all Association Board of Directors / Committees should be registered to gain advantage of the "Directors/Office Bearers

Insurance" whilst Parents involved in transporting athletes to games on weekends should be encouraged to register just for the benefits of the Insurance Coverage to and from the respective matches.

Associations are all reminded that their members who register ensure that the Associations Insurance Premiums are covered under the Basketball NSW Insurance Portfolio saving their Association huge Insurance premiums that they would have to pay otherwise for Public Liability and Directors/Office Bearers Insurance as well as Coaches and Referees indemnity.

The year 2013 saw the Registration Data Base in its 11th year of operation and the rollout of the SportZman Desktop to Associations has had an impact on the registration process particularly in the February/March/April periods.

The Registration Manual was again delivered outlining in detail the operations expected by the member organisations, with all By-Laws, Manuals and forms again being made available on the Basketball NSW website. The new website contains a secure link through the About button by selecting the Membership link where Associations using the User Name and Password sent to them previously can obtain all relevant By Laws, Manuals, Flyers and Forms in relation to Registration, Insurance and the SportZman software.

#### **GROWTH ANALYSIS**

In 2013 Basketball NSW continued strategic planning with comprehensive Growth Analysis reports. Throughout the year the process where data from two years was compared and provided invaluable information on such issues as Growth, Retention Rates, Member Losses and the Tenure and cost Value of members at the State Level as well as at the Association Level.

The growth rate was -0.23% whilst the New Registrations decreased from 47.51% to 44.57%.

Non Returning Members (Loss Rate) increased from 42.27% to 44.67% whilst the Retention Rate decreased from 57.71% to 55.30%

It is intended that all member Basketball Associations will be provided with these comprehensive Reports as well as the ability of my attendance at any Board and or Committee to assist in the analysis and or future planning of the relevant Associations needs to address the Membership Loss rates.

#### **BASKETBALL NSW HARDWARE & SOFTWARE UPGRADE**

Basketball NSW again continued to upgrade the software and hardware necessary to service the members and staff in their day to day operation.

The process of upgrading several workstations was continued as well as the upgrade of colour printers and copiers for the staff.

Ongoing maintenance was carried out by Tom Moore on a regular basis with all workstations and Notebook

computers being regularly checked out to ensure their readiness for staff.

# SETTING UP AND DISTRIBUTING THE "2013 REGISTRATION" CARDS

The Card design was put together later than normal in December of 2012 and signed off by January 2013 and the cards arrived from China in late February as expected. There was a slight delay as the re design of the cards meant re working the software to print the cards and once achieved the system worked effortlessly.

All the staff assisted in getting the Registration Cards printed and out to the members. Bankstown, City of Sydney, Hills, Hornsby, Newcastle and Northern Suburbs had specific designed cards to assist the Local Sponsors of these Associations. Northern Suburbs Basketball Association continued to have their cards distributed by Basketball NSW direct to their members by post at their cost submitting their data on a weekly basis. The Basketball NSW Registration Cards again were printed and distributed to Associations on a Monthly basis with the process taking place in the first two weeks following the closing of each Month. I must thank the part time staff of Karen and Alex who worked tirelessly throughout the year and achieved each month's targets by getting the cards printed, packed and delivered within the required timeframe.

#### **REGISTRATION DATA BASE**

Many hours were spent in further developing the SportZman Desktop Registration and Competition Management software for the member Associations and SportZman Version 11 is currently being tested for distribution to Associations in early 2013. Australia Post Suburbs and Post Code database was updated in the Version 11 release and allows the local Association to import the latest release from Australia Post.

Our thanks to the SportZman Directors and Programmers for being able to meet our ever increasing specifications requirements.

The consistent improvement in registrations has been seen from the outset with approximately 200 transactions per day and as many as 600 per day on occasions in the March and April periods, received through the SportZman Desktop software.



#### **SUMMARY**

During 2013 Basketball NSW continued the sweeping changes to the "Other" category and the Aussie Hoops, Learn to Play and Special Needs.

The On Line Registration portal is now being used by five Associations, the SportZman software interacts with the On Line portal and all online transactions are imported to the Associations database when the Association "Retrieves Updates" each morning, Hornsby, Manly and Penrith have now been joined by Blue Mountains and City of Sydney as Associations utilising the On Line Registration portal.

The "Publish to Web" feature where Association's with a very simple two button system can create their website and upload the website easily through their SportZman software, the data to be hosted by Basketball NSW and providing the Association's with the ability to link their data to their own website by a simple URL link.

For further information on these exciting projects you should contact the Basketball NSW Marketing Division.

#### **TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE**

Basketball NSW continued again to provide the best levels of technical assistance along with the added responsibility of installing and servicing SportZman to the Local Basketball Associations throughout the year.

- 1. Phone Assistance
- 2. Assistance by E-mail
- 3. Association Visit
- Installing and Servicing the SportZman Desktop products
- 5. SportZman User Group meetings

Assistance provided involved Registration Process Enquiries, both manual and electronic registration program maintenance as well as general computer and internet related advice to assist with the development and maintenance of their equipment and systems in general.

A number of Associations are still sending their data in and the data is not correct and many hours are utilised on the processing of the data to verify the accuracy of the data and to provide feedback to the Associations.

In line with the application of the Basketball NSW By-Laws the Technical Assistance provided to organisations has yet again been reviewed and clearly defined and updated in the Registration Manual.

#### **REGISTRATIONS**

In accordance with the Basketball NSW Registration By-Laws the following Associations have failed to provide registration data in 2013;

Bermagui, Hillston, Junee, Moree PCYC and Tuggerah Lakes

The following Associations were de registered by the Board during 2013 for breaches to the rules;

Glebe and Parramatta

The following Associations have submitted data that is considered inconsistent with their previous data submitted and now will face an audit before their figures are accepted;

Grafton, Kiama, Moruya, Murwillumbah, Narrabri, and Ryde Bulls

Congratulations are extended to Blue Mountains, Campbelltown, Cootamundra, Glen Innes, Griffith, Inverell, Kempsey, Liverpool, Milton Ulladulla, Mudgee, Penrith, Queanbeyan, Singleton Heights, Taree, Ungarie and Wollondilly for their efforts in generating increased numbers of registrations in a single year above 20% growth.

The Associations with the biggest increase in registration numbers was the Penrith Basketball Association with an increase of 367 members followed by the Northern Suburbs Basketball Association 192 and Liverpool Basketball with 181 members whilst the Association with the biggest decrease in numbers was Albury Basketball Association with 366 followed by Hills



Basketball Association with a 280 and Ryde Bulls with a 135 member decline.

The 2013 Members Report contained within this document is an incomplete report as Registrations are still being received for the period.

Associations who currently compete in the 2014 NSW Competitions and have failed to either register their members or do not meet the standards of the Registration By-Laws and the Definition of a Member Association will not be accepted into these competitions, Associations that have entered already will be notified immediately as to their acceptance into the relevant competitions.

In 2014 all teams' nomination forms will be checked and the respective team lists will be monitored every week, teams that have unregistered players will face the prospect of their matches being forfeited.

Associations will receive a Final 2013 member report and will be requested to sign off on their final year end data so that any anomalies will be identified at that time rather than a year later when the Budgets are being set.

Association's who have not signed off and or have failed to provide data in accordance with the rules and regulations will have to answer to the Board for all appeals against their ARP Fee structures.

Audits will now take place on participants of all NSW conducted competitions as well as on All State Teams, camps and clinics and referees.

All NITP participating athletes and all NSW State Representative teams will also be checked for their registration status.

Also included in this report is a detailed analysis of the Other Categories showing these registrations by Associations in both the Country and Metropolitan regions and compared against the previous years data, this report shows the development or lack of development by Associations in the areas of Coaches, Managers, Referees, Table Officials, Statisticians, Administrators, Sports Trainers and

Volunteers and the Associations who ensure that these members are indeed registered.

#### **Website Statistics Analysis**

In 2013 hits to the Basketball NSW website reached a massive 21,011,547.

Twelve out of twelve months of 2013 recorded more page requests than the same period in 2012. This is a testament to the Basketball NSW website and the information that has been uploaded.

March through to August was yet again the main usage periods as this is when competitions, results and development camps are in full swing.

The website received the most hits during March 2013, with 2,693,947 hits in this month. It was also strong in April with 2,372,299 hits being received. This is mainly due to the commencement of all competition in NSW being run at this time.

The Basketball NSW website is the first point of contact for many Associations and Members, and we are always trying to update and find new ways of improving and adding to the experience. The increased usage levels of the Basketball NSW website for 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 can be seen on the following usage statistics table. These graphs demonstrate the usage levels for the Basketball NSW website.

The following table shows the difference per month for each of the main categories from 2012 to the 2013 year.





### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 30 April 2014. The consolidated financial statements and notes represent those of New South Wales Basketball Association Ltd and Controlled Entities (the "consolidated group" or "group").

The separate financial statements of the parent entity, New South Wales Basketball Association Ltd, have not been presented within this financial report as permitted by the Corporations Act 2001.

#### 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001. These financial statements do not comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

The parent company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards,

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the Australian Accounting Standards Board has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

#### Accounting Policies

#### a) Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets, liabilities and results of entities controlled by New South Wales Basketball Association Ltd at the end of the reporting period. A controlled entity is any entity over which New South Wales Basketball Association Ltd has the power to govern the financial and operating policies so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

Control will generally exist when the parent owns, directly or indirectly through subsidiaries, more than half of the voting power of an entity. In assessing the power to govern, the existence and effect of holding of actual and potential voting rights are also considered.

Where controlled entities have entered or left the Group during the year, the financial performance of those entities is included only for the period of the year they were controlled. A list of controlled entities is contained in Note 13 to the financial statements.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, all inter-group balances and transactions between entities in the consolidated group have been eliminated on consolidation. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with those adopted by the parent entity.

Minority interests, being the equity in a subsidiary not attributable, directly or indirectly, to a parent are shown separately within the equity section of the consolidated statement of financial position and the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income. The minority interests in the assets comprise their interests at the date of the original business combination and their share of changes in equity since that date.

#### **Business combinations**

Business combinations occur where control over another business is obtained and results in the consolidation of its assets and liabilities. All business combinations, including those involving entities under common control, are accounted for by applying the purchase method. The purchase method requires an acquirer of the business to be identified and for the cost of the acquisition and fair values of identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities to be determined as at acquisition date, being the date that control is obtained. Cost is determined as the aggregate of fair values of assets given, equity issued and liabilities assumed in exchange for control together with costs directly attributed to the business combination. Any deferred consideration payable is discounted to present value using the entity's incremental borrowing rate.

Goodwill is recognized initially at the excess of cost over the acquirer's interest on the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities recognized. If the fair value of the acquirer's interest is greater than cost, the surplus is immediately recognized in profit or loss.

#### b) Investment in Associates

Associate companies are companies in which the Group has significant influence through holding, directly or indirectly, 20% or more of the voting power of the company. Investments in associates are accounted for in the financial statements by applying the equity method of accounting, whereby the investment initially recognized at cost and adjusted thereafter for the post-acquisition change in the Group's share of net assets of the associate company. In addition, the Group's share of the profit or loss of the associate company is included in the Group's profit or loss.

#### c) Goodwill

Goodwill on consolidation is initially recorded at the amount by which the purchase price for a business combination exceeds the fair value attributed to the interest in the net fair value of identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities at date of acquisition.

Goodwill on acquisitions of subsidiaries is included in intangible assets. Goodwill on acquisition of associates is included in investments in associates.

Changes in the ownership interests in a subsidiary are accounted for as equity transactions and do not affect the carrying value of goodwill.

Goodwill is tested annually for impairment and carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses. Gains and losses on the disposal of an entity include the carrying amount of goodwill related to the entity sold.

#### d) Income Tax

The parent company is exempted from income tax under Section 50 – 45 of the Income tax assessment Act as a non-profit sporting organisation.

#### e) Inventories

All inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned to individual items of stock mainly on the basis of weighted average cost.

#### f) Plant and Equipment

Plant and Equipment are measured on a cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses. The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount for these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis so as to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment over its expected useful life. Generally equipment is being depreciated at 33% and furniture and fittings at 20%. The cost of developing a company database system is being amortised over a 5-year period.

#### g) Property

In the year ended 31 December 2010 property – comprising a strata holding of Land and Buildings – was acquired. The asset is recorded at the original cost paid in respect of the property. A separate valuation of the land value has not been obtained as at 31 December 2013 and hence the property has not been recorded separately as to the land value and the building value. It is expected that a separate independent valuation of the Land and Buildings will be conducted on a tri-annual basis. Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of Land and Buildings will be credited to a revaluation surplus in the other comprehensive income, and any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation will be eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount will be restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Depreciation has been calculated on an estimate of the building cost of \$668,587 on a straight line basis over a period of 25 years (4%).

#### h) Leased Assets

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership are transferred to the group are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised, recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual value. Leased assets are amortised over their estimated useful lives. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all risks and benefits remain with the lesser, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

#### i) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the group's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related on-costs. Other employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made to employee superannuation funds to comply with legislative requirements and are charged as expenses when incurred.

#### j) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

Revenue from organized tours conducted by Horizons Sporting Events Pty Ltd is recognised upon the departure of the organised tour.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Dividends received from associate entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.

#### k) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

#### 1) Financial Instruments

### Recognition

Financial instruments are initially measured at cost on trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the related contractual rights or obligations exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured depending on their classification.

#### Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method and also taking into account any impairment.

#### Financial Liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost, comprising original debt less principal payments and amortisation.

#### m) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the group reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the profit or loss.

#### n) New and Amended Accounting Policies Adopted by the Group

#### **Employee** benefits

During the year the group adopted AASB 119: Employee Benefits (September 2011) and the relevant consequential amendments arising from the related Amending Standards. As a result, the group early adopted AASB 2011-11: Amendments to AASB 119 (September 2011) Arising From Reduced Disclosure Requirements because the group's financial statements are prepared under Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The group has applied AASB 119 (September 2011) and the relevant consequential amendments arising from the related Amending Standards from 1 January 2013.

For the purpose for measurement, AASB 119 (September 2011) defines obligations for short-term benefits as obligations expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related services. In accordance with AASB 119 (September 2011), provisions for short-term employee benefits (other long-term employee benefits) are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid to employees when the obligation is settled, whereas provision that do not meet the criteria for classification as short-term employee benefits) are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Previously, the group had separated provisions for benefits with similar characteristics, such as annual leave and sick leave, into short- and long-term portions, and applied the relevant measurement approach under AASB 119 to the respective portions.

As the group expects that all of its employees would use all of their annual leave entitlements earned during a reporting period before 12 months after the end of the reporting period, adoption of AASB 119 (September 2011) did not have a material impact on the amounts recognised in respect of the group's employee provisions. Note also that adoption of AASB 19 (September 2011) did not impact the classification of leave entitlements between current and non-current liabilities in the group's financial statements.

#### Fair value measurement

During the year the group adopted AASB 13: Fair Value Measurement and the relevant consequential amendments arising from the related Amending Standards. As a result, the group early adopted AASB 2012-1: Amendments to Australia Accounting Standards – Fair Value Measurement – Reduced Disclosure Requirements because the group's financial statements are prepared under Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The group has applied AASB 13 and the relevant consequential amendments arising from the related Amending Standards from 1 January 2013.

No adjustments were required to the carry value of assets or liabilities as no fair value measurements have been recorded.

#### Consolidated financial statements

The group has early adopted the following Australian Accounting Standards, together with the relevant consequential amendments arising from related Amending Standards:

- AASB 10: Consolidated Financial Statements;
- AASB 12: Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities; and
- AASB 127: Separate Financial Statements

As a result, the group early adopted AASB 2012-7: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards Arising From Reduced Disclosure Requirements because these financial statements are prepared under Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements.

AASB 10 provides a revised definition of "control" and may result in an entity having to consolidate an investee that was not previously consolidated and/or deconsolidate an investee that was consolidated under the previous accounting pronouncements. The group has applied these Accounting Standards retrospectively. Upon the application of these Standards, the group reassessed both the existing controlling relationships between the parent and its subsidiaries and the possible controlling relationship that might exist in relation to interest held in other significant investees as a result of the revised definition. Based on this assessment, the group concluded that there is no change in its control conclusions as of the date of initial application of these Standards (ie. 1 January 2013) and no material adjustments to amounts reported in the financial statements were required as a consequence of adopting these Standards. Nevertheless, AASB 12 requires some additional disclosures regarding controlled entitles in the group's financial statements. These disclosures are provided in Note 13.

#### Report on the Financial Report
