

## **CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT**





2014 has been a successful year for BNSW with growth in registrations, increased teams competing in BNSW competitions and sound financial performance. All local associations are to be thanked for their efforts during the year and all of our members should look forward to 2015, working with our base and continuing to grow the sport.

On the financial front, BNSW has operated soundly in 2014. The consolidated profit for the year was \$213436. Our business ventures were profitable and continued to provide additional income to BNSW over the year. Looking forward, we have achieved the outcome of limiting registration fee increase. Horizon Sporting Events (HSE) has changed its accounting period and the result is reduced for this year.

At the local level, there are more people participating in the sport. Programs such as school programs and Aussie Hoops have assisted in achieving this. On a pleasing note the number of child protection issues has declined.

Whilst in 2014 BNSW recorded 1.86% increase in registrations, this was on the back of a major increase the previous year. Congratulations to our members who grew their membership. There were two current incentives offered to Associations: the discount for early payment and the payment in arrears (based on June). It is extremely important that all Associations ensure all members are registered for insurance purposes and to allow the sport to demonstrate to government the growth that is being achieved. In 2014 BNSW announced further incentives to local Associations for growth in registrations.

The participation initiatives commenced in 2012 were occurring continued into 2014, with the growth in these initiatives over the previous year. These initiatives expose school age children to basketball through increased participation and the Active After Schools Program.

The development of the sport continues with coaching and refereeing programs being conducted during the year. A number of referee, referee coach, scoretable and statistics courses were held throughout the year. The number of coaching courses conducted during the year was 16, with 352 coaches being accredited, an increase of 38% including renewals.

The Country Development Program continued on from its past success and ongoing support has enabled these programs to continue to grow.

The continued development of players, coaches, referees and administrators at the local level is paramount and local Associations should ensure they actively undertake this task

The elite program was successful with the development of a number of players in the elite programs during the year. The development involved individual skills training, camps and tours. This program has contributed to the strong result for BNSW teams at National Championships.

NSW had a number of its players attend nationally based development camps and congratulations to those BNSW members who were selected to represent Australia.

BNSW referees achieved great results. BNSW sent 28 officials to various Australian National Junior Championships, of these 14 received gold medal games, 6 received bronze medal games, with the remainder representing BNSW very successfully. This year NSW gained another FIBA qualified official. Congratulations James Boyer on this achievement.

As we look toward 2015, BNSW has restricted the staff to provide a more focused service, BNSW will continue to seek to assist associations to grow their membership with targeted programs. We will try to help associations in decline to improve their ongoing prospect. BNSW will continue to explore options to assist associations in developing new facilities.

All the members of BNSW need to continue to work together to achieve growth and continued success for our great sport of basketball.

The staff of BNSW needs to be congratulated on their successful year. Of particular note, three long serving staff members John Martin, Bob Sim and Christie Graham have left BNSW and we all should thank them for all their work over the years and wish them all the best for the future.

Finally I would like to thank all fellow Board Members at BNSW for their support and effort during the year.

## CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT





As you will read in the financial section, BNSW has reaped the rewards of on-going tight cost controls, along with great contributions from our affiliates and subsidiaries, as well as a great effort by our Country Committee and as a result has posted a profit which will continue

to strengthen our Balance Sheet position. This enables us to continue to look ahead at resourcing areas of our business that will assist in helping out Member Associations to grow our sport, especially at grassroots

I would also like to comment on the economic conditions ahead of all of us, so we can plot a way through that will result in more members and growth of our sport, whilst, at the same time, keeping us all financially safe and sound.

2014 was a "spring" year for the state of NSW and we are now seeing little green leaves shoot up, getting ready for flowering and subsequent bearing of fruit.

The CommSec report (2014) of all States reported that, across all factors considered (assessment included economic growth, housing finance, population growth, unemployment levels, etc), NSW has emerged as Australia's strongest economy, a position we have not held since 2000.

The key to our resurgence has been the strength of the housing market, with more than 52,000 dwellings approved in NSW in the 12 months up to July this year.

So, how does that help us in sport?

The "green shoots" for us are these: more housing means more potential new members; lower unemployment and a strong economy means higher disposable income; that in turn means income available for sports and other forms of discretionary spending will increase.

Now that the scene is set for "flowering" and "fruit", we all have to begin our individual jobs of positioning basketball as the most attractive alternative to all our target families (instead of another sport).

BNSW is doing all it can to assist in this, despite our own internal costs (electricity, petrol, paper, insurance) all rising significantly above CPI and often rising by double-digits. We have kept our registration increases below CPI and in fact our average increase since 2010 has been below 3%. We have managed to do this (despite our internal costs

rising above CPI) because we continue to succeed in obtaining revenue from other sources (thank you to our affiliate businesses!)

In addition, in our 2015 budget most of our proposed expenditure are directed at areas of assistance to the grass roots and participation programs.

So, I am optimistic that we will make 2015 a good year for basketball. As I write this report, our registrations are ahead of this time last year by some 3.9%. Again, more "green shoots".

You would have noticed already that for the first time ever, BNSW and yourselves, are now servicing 5 different generations (The baby boomers, X-Gen, Y-Gen, Generation Z/Boomlets, Generation Alpha and the Mature). Because of this, it is now important that all of us need to consider how we communicate to our membership. Only some will want to receive a piece of paper in the mail, others will want an SMS and others an email. The reality we all face is that we now have to communicate to the various generations in different ways. You would have noticed that BNSW has already begun this. We are on YouTube, Facebook, Twitter, etc. We strongly recommend that each of you segment your membership and "talk" to them according to how that segment prefers it.

Also we are all needing to collectively "talk up" our beloved sport. I now attach below, facts you can all use when talking to prospective new members, sponsors, politicians and anyone else, so we can highlight to all the beauty of basketball:

#### As at 15 May 2014

#### General

Basketball is the number two sport globally with 214 national federations participating in basketball internationally and with over 450 million players regularly playing the game.

A global study conducted by Roper Starch Worldwide based on 35,000 interviews, showed that 11% of the world plays basketball.

The most recent Sweeney Sports research in Australia shows that one in three Australians have an interest in basketball.

Basketball is played by approximately one million men and women, boys and girls throughout Australia.

Throughout Australia's States and Territories, there are:

- 426 local associations;
- 20,000 clubs; and
- 60,000 teams.

#### **Participation**

Basketball is played by approximately one million men and women, boys and girls throughout Australia:

- 1,015,000 grassroots participants;
- 625,000 participants 15 years and over; and
- 390,000 participants under 15 years.

Basketball is the  $2^{nd}$  highest team participation sport in Australia. 9% of Australians aged between 5 and 75 years currently play basketball.

42% of participants play basketball weekly.

25% of Australians have participated in basketball during their life. 5% of Australians provide volunteer support to basketball.

27% of Australians consider themselves fans of basketball – while 8% consider themselves 'fanatics'.

42,000 primary aged children participate in the *Federal Government's Active After Schools* basketball program – the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest participated sports program.

#### Children's Participation

The latest sports participation data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics – released in October 2012 – shows basketball has defied the national trend and continued to grow its already strong participation base among children.

The Children's Participation in Cultural and Leisure Activities survey collected information on participation in sport, cultural activities and use of technology for children aged between 5 and 14.

Overall, the study found that 42,000 fewer Australian children are playing organised sport than three years ago.

However, basketball participation for 5 – 14 year olds jumped from 201,900 in 2009 to 220,200 in 2012 – that's an increase of 7.9%, or 18,000 participants.

Since the 2006 version of the ABS study, basketball participation among children has grown by almost 44,000 children – that's 25% in six years.

That growth is even more remarkable when you consider that the same ABS study found nearly all other major participation sports – including cricket, swimming, netball, tennis and Australian Rules Football – suffered a decline in participation levels within the same timeframe.

Basketball has always been one of Australia's strongest participation sports / and the latest ABS data cements this.

These numbers are a ringing endorsement of the strength and effectiveness of Basketball Australia's grassroots, children's participation programs – such as Aussie Hoops and No School, No Play.

#### **National Teams**

Australia is currently ranked as the 5<sup>th</sup> best basketball nation in the world out of 214 nations with international Basketball Federations. Our four senior national teams are all within the top ten in the world:

- The Women's National Basketball Team the Opals – is ranked second in the world by FIBA.
- The Men's National Basketball Team the Boomers – is ranked ninth in the world by FIBA.
- The Women's National Wheelchair Basketball Team – the Gliders – is ranked second in the world by the International Wheelchair Basketball Federation (IWBF).
- The Men's National Wheelchair Basketball Team

   the Rollers is ranked second in the world by
   the IWBF.

Our junior elite programs are showcasing the talent coming through the ranks. Over the last year, we've seen: silver for the men and bronze for the women at the World Uni Games; bronze for the Gems at the FIBA U19 Championships and a fourth place finish for the Emus, and both of our U17 teams qualified for the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

#### Women's National Basketball League

The Women's National Basketball League (WNBL), which completed its 34th consecutive season in 2013/14, is Australia's longest running elite female national competition –.

More than 94,000 fans attended WNBL games throughout the 2013/14 season, culminating in the sell-out crowd at the Grand Final between Bendigo and Townsville, hosted at Bendigo Stadium.

In 2013/14, we recorded a 4% rise in average attendances on last season – the WNBL's third consecutive year of growth.

The league is proud to have held a free-to-air television partnership with the ABC since 1989.

In 2013/14, the WNBL recorded television viewing audiences of 1,254,000 – at an average per game viewing audience of 56,000 – an 8% increase on the previous season.

An average television audience of 123,000 viewers tuned into the  $2013/14\ Grand\ Final.$ 

In 2013/14, fans enjoyed expanded coverage of the WNBL:

 One game a week shown in full at 3:00pm nationally on ABC's free-to-air TV channel, ABC1, with the a

In 2014, BA has complete carriage of the national programs at the Centres of Excellence. These are the homes of elite basketball in Australia, where our players come to up their game and go from good to great.

The CoE has streamlined our men's and women's national team programs, covering camps, residentials, and ongoing athlete development.

The expertise at the CoE allows us to accelerate athletic development in our players, giving them every opportunity to reach their elite potential.

#### **Aussie Hoops**

The junior sport program of choice for your kids: BA's official national junior participation program for children aged 5-10.

A safe, accessible and fun introduction to basketball which promotes skills development in an accredited coaching environment.

Relaunching in 2014, the program will be bigger and better than ever: Aussie Hoops Program will have reached a projected total of 363,000 participants through 1080 schools and 247 associations by 2016.

#### NBA

Australia is an important market for the NBA in the region and the league enjoys a great following from basketball fans.

Australia is ranked No.1 internationally for NBA League Pass subscriptions as well as NBA store online sales, showing a huge appetite for the league.

Basketball NSW High Performance department continued to provide a wide range of development programs, events and opportunities for NSW coaches and athletes in 2014. The primary focus of the department is to provide development opportunities from junior participation programs to the elite area with the State Junior Representative Teams and National Intensive Training Program (NITP).

#### Participation & Broad-Based Development

Basketball NSW continues to understand the importance of bringing new players to the sport and also providing coaching, instruction and development to players as they enter our sport. In 2014, Basketball NSW engaged in a series of broad-based development programs and specialist camps, designed to provide education to players and coaches. The Development League, introduced in 2012, was held again in 2014 and now consists of 260 player's aged 13 – 17 years and 48 coaches from both metropolitan and country Associations.

### National Intensive Training Program (NITP)

Basketball New South Wales National Intensive Training Program (NITP), under the direction of head coach Mark Watkins, continued to provide development opportunities to elite athletes aged 14-17 years in 2013/2014 through a series of camps and small group sessions. The NITP cycle went from October 2013 to August 2014.

The squad included 126 athletes from throughout the state, representing 12 country (Albury, Temora, Nowra, Illawarra, Gosford, Dubbo, Tamworth, Newcastle, Maitland, Coffs Harbour, Tuggerah, Bathurst) and 8 metropolitan Associations (Penrith, Norths, Manly, Hills, Bankstown, Sutherland, Comets, Hornsby) with some 28 coaches working in the program as network coaches.

#### **Network Coach Development**

Development of NITP network coaches was identified as a key area for the 2014 program and initiatives were implemented to ensure our coaching network is gaining development at camps and in other areas.

As part of each camp, a series of meetings are held to talk about the technical curriculum and also share information gained from the international stage and flowing down from our national team coaches and the AIS head coaches. Basketball Australia coaching director Mike McHugh also attended selected camps.

Literature has also been sent to network coaches regarding the latest coaching techniques and trends impacting basketball internationally.

A lecture was held at each of the NITP camps to discuss areas that the International game is headed and how NSW athletes are best served to continue developing the skills required to compete at the International level.

#### Acknowledgements

The New South Wales NITP continues to receive tremendous support from the Board and senior management of Basketball New South Wales, including the provision of staff & resources to provide a quality development program to NSW athletes and coaches. It is also important to acknowledge the NSW Basketball Associations that continue to provide support for the program through the provision of courts and facilities, along with the hard working base of volunteer coaches who remain the backbone of the program.

## National Coach Accreditation Scheme (NCAS) Coach Education and Development

The ongoing education and development of NSW coaches continues to be a focus for Basketball New South Wales and this is carried out through formal coach education courses (NCAS Club Coach –Formerly Level 1 and Association Coach – Formerly Level 2 courses) and Association based clinics and regional coaching clinics.

With the support of NSW Country Basketball Committee, Basketball NSW development staff, through the country development program, engaged in a series of regional coach development clinics and seminars throughout the state, Basketball NSW acknowledges this ongoing support.

Basketball NSW also conducts "Coach Development Seminars" that covers a wide range of coaching topics, along with sports science and athlete management education.

In October of 2014, Basketball NSW announced an organisation restructure. A part of this restructure saw the following departments of competitions, participation, growth and customer service, all combining to form NSW Games & Community Growth.

The NSW Games & Community Growth department has the responsibility to ensure that participation and competition infrastructures are integrated and that they provide for a sustainable future that will continue to evolve as the basketball community in NSW grows.

#### Competitions

We have commenced a review of the Molten Waratah League in relation to the conditions of entry into the league and the best competition formats for each of the divisions on offer. In addressing the review, the Waratah League Advisory Committee Bob McGugan – Chair, Vicki Croucher – Bankstown, Richard Boyle – Maitland, Helen Godfrey – City of Sydney & Neil Goffet – Newcastle, along with myself and Debbie Keirs, have already met numerous times, as this is a key priority for the business.

The next phase of the review will see a number of participant forums held, where a cross section of the participants in the league will be consulted and asked to provide feedback.

Other priorities being addressed in the competitions area include:

- · Harmonizing the basketball calendar.
- A new era for how competitions are managed – embracing technology.
- Engaging associations at a strategic level to ensure all underpinning programs are implemented.

#### **Community Growth**

There are a number of major projects under the Community Growth area, such as the Aussie Hoops, Basketball Australia's official junior development program for 5-10 year olds. Basketball Australia launched the new and improved Aussie Hoops program. Aussie Hoops enables participants of all abilities the opportunity to learn in a structured, inclusive and safe environment.

Another major project for Community Growth includes Sporting Schools. In partnership with the Australian Sports Commission and Basketball Australia, the Sporting Schools project has been designed to assist in building the relationship between schools and sports.

Basketball NSW will be working closely with all of its associations as we encourage them all to participate in these two projects.

In addition to this, Basketball NSW's Country and Metropolitan Association Liaison Managers have been out in the field visiting associations. In general, the roles of our CALM & MALM's are to be a focal point of communication and delivery of customer service to our member associations.

Scott Balsar - full time CALM, Graeme Reid - part-time CALM, Tom Moore - part-time MALM, along with myself, in the coming year will be visiting associations to assist and monitor the implementation of projects and to ensure Basketball NSW achieves the outcomes as outlined in the strategic plan.

Other priorities being addressed in the community growth area include:

- The Basketball Network Basketball Australia's whole of sport technology solution.
- To support our associations to share knowledge and resources with others, a "Learn – Share – Grow" philosophy.
- Create new pathways for individuals and organisations to participate in basketball in NSW.
- Create a community of leaders who will work together to lift the profile of basketball in NSW.

#### **Technical Officials**

Led by Debbie Keirs, Basketball NSW Technical Officials Development Program continues to grow with success at the top end, with a number of NSW officials (referees, statisticians, scoretable officials & educators) being selected to represent Australia at official FIBA events.

Success has occurred also on home soil. These will be outlined further in Debbie's section of this annual report.

As in any year, it's also not without its challenges, as the demand for officials to service games exceeds the supply and this is at all levels of competition domestic, juniors and seniors. We are confident, that with the addition of 2 new staff at Basketball NSW in the technical area, we will be able to grow this area with new initiatives in the coming year.

Other priorities being addressed in the technical officials area include:

- Reducing the dropout rate of officials across all Leagues.
- Increase education opportunities for all officials.
- Lifting the profile of officials in basketball.
- Maintain our successful position at Australian Junior Championships and National Leagues.

## **COUNTRY COMMITTEE**



The success of the Country Committee is not just based on the activities of its members but on the huge assistance given by Country people in general in all of its activities.

Being a volunteer based organisation, it would not be possible to achieve what has been done without the enthusiasm and drive of a lot of people in support of the various Country Programs.

#### **Growth of Sport**

#### **Country Development Program (CDP)**

The third year of the CDP has just been completed and has proven to be one of the most valuable assets instigated by Country Basketball.

Camps were conducted at 10 venues involving 1000 players and 80 coaches and managers.

The program is on the way to achieving its objectives or in some cases has reached some of its goals. To re-engage with the Country and provide leadership and development opportunities for players, coaches, referees and administrators.

- To develop a pathway from grassroots to elite levels of sports in the above areas.
- To provide mentoring to the above participants.
- To rebuild the culture of the sport that reflects the ethics of the bush – respects commitment to hard work.
- Encourage female participation at all levels.

The three year period of the program has shown that it is sustainable, has value, and is continuing to grow.

Superb efforts by Director of CDP Rex Nottage, Tim Mallon, John Hargreaves, Greg O'Toole, Paul Masters, Leeanne Palmer,

Margaret Beaumont, and Lara Shippard must be noted. The Committee has invested in improving the technology available to coaches and players at the camps.

#### Under 12 Skills Days - July

10 Venues conducted the Skills day in July with over 400 participant's .Selections were made from these days for players to attend the Country Jamboree.

Each venue had a Head coach and assistants with an Administrator to organise the day .All participants received a Tee shirt.

#### Country Jamboree - September

The first weekend of the School holidays at Port Macquarie involved an expansion of the Jamboree from 144 to 160

players and 20 coaches and managers and 20 referees and 4 referee coaches.

Again there was a strong army of parents to support the players and the various games and social activities. The venue was expanded from 3 to 5 courts with the use of the double court at the School.

#### **Great Murray Jamboree**

40 Boys and girls then made the journey to Albury for the Great Murray Jamboree where the players were mixed with players from ACT, New Zealand and South Australia.

#### **Finance**

The activities of the Committee in its various programs allows for fund raising to occur. The committee does have accumulated funds but deliberately budgets use of some of the funds each year to finance current or new programs.

Programs and projects include;

- Regional Academies of Sport at North Coast, Western, Southern and in the future Northern Inlands (Tamworth).
- Country State player Assistance with travel to National Championships.
- Country State player's scholarships to assist with training costs for those who live more than 300 km from Sydney.
- Country State team management assistance for training.
- 28 scholarships for young referees to attend the Jamborees.
- \$12,000 contribution to the ACJBC and CDT events to assist coaches, managers, referees and travel costs.
- There has been an investment in equipment for coaching at camps especially in the technology area where a variety of programs and equipment is now available .Budgets are planning for more investment in the referee coaching technology area.



## **COUNTRY COMMITTEE**



#### Competitions.

#### The Country Tournament

June continues to be an excellent opportunity for teams to gain prestige while at the same time measuring their progress against the rivals.

8 venues were used with an increase to 108 boy's teams and 78 girl's teams for a total of 186 against 173 in 2013. The increase in Boys teams was pleasing especially in Under 18 boys. Under 18 Girls continue to be weak and an eye is needed on Under 16 women.

Associations continue to struggle to cover their nominations with referees of the required standard and this is serious reflection on the lack of development at the grass root level.

CPL rules continue to be used in Division 1 events but we have failed to convince the Competitions Dept of BNSW of the value of including the Tournament as a round of the CPL and hence reducing costs, travel, time on the road in general for teams.

#### **Country Junior Leagues**

The junior Leagues continue to grow in all regions. The CPL has opened the pathway for teams to progress to higher levels of competition and be rewarded.

#### **National Level**

The effects of the CDP improving standards in all areas, was most obvious this year.

Under 18 Men – runners up Silver, Under 18 Women –  $7^{\text{th}}$  Under 16 Men – Gold for the consecutive year. Under 16 Women –  $3^{\text{rd}}$  Bronze. What a year.

Congratulations to all especially John Hargreaves on his second Under 16 title in as many years.

#### **Country Development Events**

## Australian Country Junior Basketball Cup – Albury – January

This event continues to be a focal point for development and further selection for Under 16 and 18 players while showing Under 14 players what the representative level is about. A great event for players, coaches and referees. NSW nominated two teams in Under 18, 16, 14 boys and girls.

Three teams won finals and several referees were allocated to finals and one was selected for the New Zealand Easter Tournament.

13 players were selected to attend the New Zealand Easter event

#### **Pacific Coast Slam**

This event is for Under 15 and 17 players and prepares players for the AJCBC .Teams from New Zealand compete in the event.

In recent years the quality of the event has deteriorated and in 2015 Country proposes to conduct a new style of Development Camp called the Country Development Camp Tournament.

#### Marketing

IGA were again on board in assisting the Country Committee.

The sponsorship has assisted greatly in the purchase of coaching equipment particularly in the electronic and I/T areas.

The Country Development Program naming rights were granted to IGA and prominent advertising and signage occurred.

Money has also been allocated to regional administration and refereeing projects.

Basketball NSW continued to hold Regional Referee Action Days in 2014 to help some of our officials gain better access to up-to-date information without extensive travel. These were held in Gosford, Bathurst, Queanbeyan, Tamworth and Port Macquarie.

A Main Senior and a main Junior League Referee Action Day were held in 2014. BNSW will continue to develop these Action Day so we can try to encourage a consistent approach to all games. We will be introducing Mini Action Days to eliminate as much travel for Junior League officials.

BNSW was fortunate to have numerous referees selected at Basketball Australia Junior National Championships to officiate medal games, and also a high percentage were again successful in receiving semi-finals. 15 Gold Medal officials' positions and 14 Bronze Medal official positions, a very strong result for NSW! Congratulations to all officials who participated.

Congratulations to James Boyer who was awarded his FIBA Badge in 2014.

Continuation of Metropolitan Referee Coordinators meetings in 2014, which will continue into 2015. Some Associations have found this a valuable networking opportunity.

A Level 2 Referee Course was held by Basketball NSW, with upgrades of several officials during the 2014 season. More will continue to be evaluated and upgraded early in 2015. 3 x Grade 0 Referee Coach Course, 2 x Grade 1 Referee Coaches Course were held by Basketball NSW in 2014 to assist referee educators at Association and League level. Basketball NSW has been happy to assist as many Associations as possible in order to develop someone to assist their officials at home. BNSW staff also delivered 6 x Level 1 Referee Courses, 15 x Beginner Courses, 2 x Level 2 Referee Courses and 1 x Level 3 Referee Courses and facilitated many of our volunteer course presenters to deliver additional courses.

Basketball NSW staff visited many Associations (as well as hosting at the BNSW office) to run workshops including conflict management, referee coaching, pre game/preventative officiating, in both Metro and Country venues.

The Scoretable Committee, in conjunction with BNSW staff, continued to produce the Scoretable Brochure, and laminated sheets on the bench for all leagues and tournaments. The brochure was available on the website and was appreciated by many parents.

Country Jamboree continued to see Junior Country Officials receive 24 scholarships to attend both these tournaments.

BNSW Coaching Department continued the Metro D-League which saw many officials being rostered by BNSW Referees Department and gaining an opportunity for extra coaching and game practice.

The finals weekend saw many scoretable officials receive upgrades from the previous year's courses. BNSW ran 5 x Level 0 Scoretable Courses, 4 x Level 1 Scoretable courses as well as a 3 x Level 2 courses and 2 x Level 3 courses.

The 2014 Senior League Finals saw an outstanding display of officiating and playing. The finals were held at Maitland and a great job was done by our officials, referees, referee coaches, scoretable and statisticians.

2014 saw the continuation of an on-line rostering system for BNSW for the senior league. Country Premier League was also entered in via this system. BNSW electronically notifies via SMS all appointments which has helped us inform our officials digitally as per their preference.

Basketball NSW continued to have the AAGPS (private schools) competition as part of our referee portfolio, under the direction of BNSW. Thank you to all the officials who support this BNSW facilitated program.

BNSW continued with "Country Premier League" in 2014. This saw the best junior teams and officials from regional NSW come together for great basketball. BNSW referee staff attended all CPL rounds and finals to assist with referee education and development for our regional officials.

The Junior Leagues are continuing to develop more with each year. The State Championships in 2014 saw an even mix of country and metropolitan officials, with some new faces stepping up to this level from our CPL . The State Cup also saw a mix of country and metro officials, and all did an outstanding job.

Basketball NSW continued with a recognition certificate to thank our really committed senior league referees,

## **PARTICIPATION**



It is no secret - the only way to grow our sport is from the grassroots up – our future viability depends on it.

Aussie Hoops is Basketball Australia's national program to reach out to kids in the Primary School age bracket & introduce them to basketball.

The program was originally launched in 2002 & then relaunched late in 2014 with much vim & vigor.

We want the Aussie Hoops brand name to become a household name where people recognise it as the starting point for kids jumping into basketball.

When an Association joins up, they are provided with the tools to confidently run a program even if it is for the first time – it even provides a locator so prospective parents can find the nearest centre to them.

The process is completely electronic which takes away some of the mundane, manual tasks currently being undertaken with registering for a program, collection of money & BNSW registration entering.

The colourful packs (backpack, ball & reversible singlet) available enhance each program & transform the perception to an academy & feedback confirms that the packs are a great selling tool for the Aussie Hoops program.

Since the relaunch, we currently have 38 centres signed up with another 12 in the process. This is a huge result considering we only had a handful of centres 6 months ago.

The Australian Sports Commission is also driving their new program, Sporting Schools, which replaces its previous Active After schools Community program.

Basketball

Australia has agreed with the ASC to promote this initiative directly into the primary schools using Aussie Hoops with the ASC providing the schools with funding.

Basketball NSW are currently running 2 pilot programs this term with 4 more pilot programs to run in term 2 in metropolitan & regional areas. Schools who previously ran AAsC programs will be invited by ASC to run Sporting Schools programs

during term 2 & then all other schools in Australia will be invited to join in for term 3.

This will give us a great opportunity to gain access into primary schools.

We look forward to more information being available shortly so that we can advise all our Associations how they can proceed to take advantage of this great opportunity.

#### Constitution

As part of the ongoing review of all of its governance procedures, Basketball NSW (BNSW) commenced a review of its constitution in 2012 which is continuing. This review is supported by the Department of Sport and Recreation (DSR) as part of a wider governance review incorporating several of our policies and By-Laws (mentioned later in this report). Basketball Australia's Constitution is currently under major review and changes to BNSW's may also need to be included in our ongoing review.

The ongoing review of our member's constitutions has continued throughout 2014 with many Associations reviewing and adopting the new DSR formatted constitution..

There is a continuing pressure by both DSR and the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) for all of our Associations to review their constitutions. A joint approach in 2013 with the OFT has continued into 2014 with many of our member associations ensuring that outstanding returns are completed and submitted to the OFT. This is an important part of an Association's accountability to their members, financial information and a knowledge that their Association is operating within the guidelines that govern the operation of incorporated bodies is the first step in having an open and transparent governing body. The OFT highlighted many issues that have been worked through with each affected association during 2014. It is pleasing to note that the majority of associations are now fully compliant with the OFT

### **Sportsrage**

It was reported in last year's report that there had been an improvement in 2013 but 2014 saw many of the old issues resurface; the 'win at any cost' philosophy is damaging the relationships between some of our associations. There are many Associations that feel impotent in dealing with their coaches once selected and the lack of any overall development plan for players and officials has meant a piece meal approach has been taken in trying to achieve the overall aim of creating a safe enjoyable environment for all participants. The coaching to create a large positive difference in the 'for' and 'against' points ratio has also led to teams overplaying their opponents. Both BNSW and its member Associations have implemented a Zero Tolerance approach to inappropriate behaviour, but there has to be greater co-operation between competing Associations and

their team personnel and competition organisers in dealing with conflict situations. BNSW has in place appropriate mechanisms for team officials through their respective Associations to comment about official behaviour. This is then dealt with on a professional level; there is no need for coaches and their supporters resorting to the level of abuse that was apparent during 2012 and to a lesser degree in 2013.

Debbie Keirs has conducted several seminars on dealing with conflict during 2014 as she did in 2013 and have been well received by those attending.

The absolute number of officials has increased and Associations should be congratulated for the work that they do in this area but it is still the minority of Associations that have accepted their responsibility in this very important area. The downside of this situation is that the demands on our officials are forever increasing with not only BNSW increasing their demand but also unaffiliated bodies utilising the skills of our Association officials to an increasing level as well.

The "Green Shirt" for Young Referees program continues to develop and show positive results but it requires further commitment by administrators in giving these burgeoning officials all the support we can muster in supporting their development and continued performance in this difficult task. We must all accept the continued viability of our sport requires us to work hard at retaining all participants in our sport, especially those that accept the additional responsibility of officiating at games at all levels. Code of Conduct breeches by Coaches resulted in a number of Behavior Agreements being signed and in a few cases suspensions were involved.

#### **Tribunals**

With the introduction of the Basketball Australia's Draft set of Tribunal By-Laws, BNSW has redrafted its own By-Laws to keep the basics of the protections that our current By-Laws give our participants whilst utilising the basics outlined in BA's draft by-laws

Several Associations have introduced 'sin bin' type scenarios and these work when Association officials are consistent in the application of the rules accompanying such schemes.

It does appear however, that the Associations are finding it increasingly more difficult to staff their disciplinary tribunal panels as does BNSW. The volunteer nature of this activity has put pressure on Associations as there is a growing number of charged persons who are accompanied by legal representation. This puts further pressure on this volunteer base, most are not legally qualified or possess the necessary skills to combat the wily legal professional who on occasions takes over the hearing and treats it like a court room. There are now several associations who have adopted the BNSW practice of getting guilty persons to sign behaviour agreements as this puts additional pressures on the participant to change their behaviour to ensure that a longer suspension does not result with further infractions of the rules. Inappropriate behaviour is the sole responsibility of the participant who displays such behaviours and these behaviour agreements make it easier for associations to take follow up action outside of the Disciplinary Tribunal rules.

#### Insurance

Basketball NSW renewed its policies with V Insurance in September, 2014. Additionally, Basketball NSW has again applied and secured exemption for Referees to be included in an Association's Workers Compensation calculations. with the NSW Sporting Injuries Committee.

This exemption covers registered Referees, Scoretable, Statisticians and Sports Trainers, and highlights the importance of all participants being registered.

#### **Legislative Changes**

The 2013 Privacy Act came into force in 2014 as well as new procedures being adopted for the Working with Children Check – sporting groups are being introduced to the new procedures in 2015/16.

#### **Grants**

The Grants process conducted by the DSR continues to undergo change as the new Coalition government makes the changes to its operating structures of government and continues to be very cost conscious.

BNSW continued to receive its funding under its triennial agreement with the DSR, which was carried forward into 2014 on a yearly basis. The amount of the grant was \$55,000.

The ITCP continues to attract a grant from the Australian Sports Commission through Basketball Australia; this process is under review by BA.

Players with an Intellectual Disability continued to gain support from the DSR.

# **ADMINISTRATION**



The process of constitutional review begun in 2010 continued further in 2014. Associations that have taken the step to renew their constitutions have tended to also look at other policies and renew them as well. Competition bylaws are also being looked at as these have tended to be at old and out of date. Pressures by new parents to achieve greater outcomes for their children has meant many policies have had to be looked at to ensure that complaints and general questions can be answered consistently across the board and not reliant on who gets asked the question. This type of process puts great pressure on association volunteers and on existing by-laws and policies. The ongoing need for all to be seen as open and transparent in their dealings with their members, associations have to have in place appropriate mechanisms to ensure that they can deal with issues as they arise.

The provision of the 'Safe Coaching' dialogue to Association coaches has had a positive effect for both BNSW and Associations and the greater number of requests by Associations for the session indicates that they are viewing this aspect of their operations as being at risk. This process is adapted to Association needs and preferred format. These discussions about safe coaching practices and the related child protection issues is also seen as a step in improving the relationships between parents, players and their respective Associations. There are still situations that are being highlighted where coaches, in particular, are placing themselves in a position of harm.

2014 saw more reports specifically targeting misuse of social media. These reports covered instances of inappropriate behaviour, inappropriate contact between adults and players and inappropriate comments being made about officials. The latter could have been better handled by using the 'Game Report' (this is where coaches get the opportunity to formally report on the performance of the officials of their games and is submitted through their association), the others through use of zero tolerance reports and other member protection type comments. These reports resulted in Associations having to deal with more local issues as well as BNSW having to deal with issues across all our leagues. Associations have accepted the need, as part of their governance processes, to have an internal mechanism to deal with these issues as they arise. BNSW was required to assist with some of these issues. Through Basketball NSW's discussion processes it

is apparent that the majority of people spoken to during the talks mentioned above there is a ready acceptance that the approach is appropriate and regarded as an important plank in delivering a better outcome for our younger players. It appears that this initiative has been accepted by the wider basketball community. The physical presence of BNSW Staff at events, the greater acceptance on the part of Associations of the role that they need to adopt in assisting venue hosts to control instances of inappropriate behaviour is pleasing to see but we need to continue to work at getting better at this very important aspect of our activity. Again it further highlights that co-operation gives a better outcome and the enjoyment levels by all, will increase. In 2013 it was decided that discussion about the court supervision role needed to be conducted and this was conducted in 2014.

Bullying has continued to be an issue that associations appear to be well aware of and taking steps to try and alleviate or minimise its effects on its participants. The 'Safe Coaching' session has been amended to include specific ways of assisting coaches and associations to determine if bullying is happening within their team structures. The role of social media, especially the instantaneous nature of cyber communications has meant that avenues are now open for bullying to occur on a more frequent basis and without face to face contact. BNSW's role as an educator and the provider of advice became even more apparent, additionally it became apparent that the majority of Associations are now able to deal with most issues themselves and have nearly all adopted social media policies that assists them in dealing with situations where inappropriate comments are made and could be construed as bringing the association or its members into disrepute.

Risk audits of venues are becoming more and more important. Insurers do not want to be exposed to risky operations, so there will be a push in the future for Associations to become more aware of the areas in which they are placing themselves at risk. Basketball NSW has focused on this issue throughout the year and will continue in 2014. Several PowerPoint presentations have been developed to assist Associations in recognising the need to change the previously narrow view on risk away from just injuries to the wider area that issues involving 'duty of care' now encompass. It is understood that all risk cannot be eliminated, but good risk management practices can minimise it greatly. In 2014 this will be further discussed as

new guidelines have been received from the DSR on risk audits. Many enquiries about these issues are being raised, not only with local Associations but with BNSW and relevant government bodies. There have been many questions by parents direct to BNSW and it is hard to determine whether this is just frustration or an indicator that complaint and review mechanisms in some Associations need to be improved. Associations are informed of queries raised and in some instances; Associations will have to accept that their procedures have to be timely, open and transparent.

Governance, and its related issues, remains a risk that we have to work hard at maintaining the highest possible standards as possible.

Governance will become more and more important as an issue and BNSW will continue its role in seeking and providing timely advice on issues.

The issue of players, coaches and managers participating without being registered, particularly those that play representative basketball or participate in development opportunities creates a risk for both BNSW and its Members. Allowing unregistered players to play poses a great risk to Associations and to Basketball NSW and was a continued focus in 2014

#### **AUDIT**

BNSW's Audit has a greater reliance on information gleaned from our information sources. With the work being done on retention and growth patterns, the Audit function will shift more to a compliance type checks. Retention and growth analysis profiles are being developed across the state and these profiles form a handy part to our audit process and when combined with census and data gleaned from both state and local sources, more specific questions can now be focused at associations in relation to these issues.

The employment of a Country Association Liaison Manager will put an emphasis on this area in 2014 for country associations but will also assist associations in all areas of governance.

#### Marketing

The age of social media is well and truly upon us. Facebook, twitter and many other social media sites have changed the way businesses not only communicate with their customers but also how customers communicate with their companies of choice.

Customers now want instant answers, information and service, thanks to social media now being now the preferred platform for communication. BNSW has started down the path of a new social media policy in 2014 that will grow over the coming year.

Joining sites like Facebook, twitter, Instagram and YouTube and linking them all through our main site, BNSW.com.au, will allow us to create new platforms by which to deliver scores, pictures and videos and provide other forums for our members to receive information from and provide information to BNSW.

Potential sponsors now want to know our Facebook likes and reach and how many people we engage with daily and weekly on social media. We are creating a social media profile for BNSW which we can use to attract new sponsors in the future.

One key aspect of our new social media platform has been to create #BNSW. This hashtag will not only help create an online resources of photos, videos and stats linked to it, but will help increase our reach and in turn improve our marketability when looking for new sponsorship opportunities. Late 2014, it was decided to place #BNSW on the new junior league referee shirts. We believe BNSW is one of the first sporting bodies globally to take on this initiative.

Growth targets have been set for all our social media platforms and we have been steadily working towards achieving them. Our Facebook page likes alone increased by almost 650 in the last quarter of 2014.

After such positive feedback, the Waratah Wrap will be back in 2015. We will be looking to expand its coverage to help promote more leagues, teams and players from BNSW competitions.

BNSW is committed to helping our member associations grow their social media platforms. Over the coming year, we will be providing training sessions, templates and other resources to our member associations so they can use social media to help grow and engage with their members.

#### Commercial

Financially, 2014 for BNSW has been no different to that of any other association or company. BNSW has continued to search for alternative and new sources of revenue to help control the increasing pressure of costs that businesses in today's climate can face.

To help diversify our revenue, BNSW has also created Stadium Sports Management (SSM). SSM is a wholly owned subsidiary of BNSW. There seems to be a growing preference by local Councils to move back to sporting organizations when offering their sites for tenders. SSM is our response to that.

IFMG again has paid BNSW a dividend on its investment. Whilst HSE could have also paid a dividend to BNSW, as it has done for many years, HSE is going through a growth phase and it was decided not to pay a dividend so we could retain funds in the company in order to help fund its growth. This decision should be rewarded in the coming years

BNSW has continued its sponsorship with Molten. They will continue to be the naming rights sponsor of the Molten Waratah League in 2015.

A special thank you to Bob Sim, who has now retired. Bob has given many years' service, not only to BNSW, but also to basketball. I would like to thank Bob for all he has done for BNSW. There has been much growth seen at BNSW under Bob's leadership in his role as General Manager for the Commercial Division and we will continue to build on his good work. Thank you Bob!

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

The financial statuments were authorised for issue on 30 March 2015. The consolidated financial statuments and notes represent those of New South Wales Bucketball Association Ltd and Controlled Entities (the "consolidated group" or "group").

The separate financial statements of the parent entity, New South Wales Baskerball Association Ltd, have not been presented within this financial report as permitted by the Corporations Act 2001.

#### 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Havis of Preparation

The financial statements are general perpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB") and the Corporations Act 2001. These financial statements do not comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB").

The purers company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set not accounting policies that the Australian Accounting Standards. Board has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the proporation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements have been prepared as an accusals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

#### Accounting Policies

#### a) Principles of Consolidation

The controlled financial statements incorporate the assets, liabilities and results of entities controlled by New South Wales Baskethall Association Ltd at the end of the reporting period. A controlled entity is any entity over which New South Wales Baskethall Association Ltd has the power to govern the financial and operating policies so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

Control will generally exist when the parent owns, directly or indirectly through subsidiaries, more than half of the coting power of an entity. In assessing the power to govern, the excittence and effect of holding of actual and potential voting rights are also obtained.

Where controlled entities have entered or left the Group during the year, the financial performance of these entities is included only for the period of the year they were controlled. A list of controlled entities is contained in Note 13 to the financial statements.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, all inter-group balances and transactions between entities in the consolidated group have been eliminated on consolidation. Cost is determined as the aggregate of fair values of assets given, equity issued and liabilities assumed in exchange for control together with costs directly attributed to the business combination. Any deferred consideration payable is discounted to present value using the entity's incremental borrowing rate.

Goodwill is recognized initially at the excess of cost over the acquirer's interest on the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities recognized. If the fair value of the acquirer's interest is greater than cost, the surplus is immediately recognized in profit or loss.

#### b) Investment in Associates

Associate companies are companies in which the Group has significant influence through holding, directly or indirectly, 20% or more of the voting power of the company. Investments in associates are accounted for in the financial statements by applying the equity method of accounting, whereby the investment initially recognized at cost and adjusted thereafter for the post-acquisition change in the Group's share of net assets of the associate company. In addition, the Group's share of the profit or loss of the associate company is included in the Group's profit or loss.

#### c) Goodwill

Goodwill on consolidation is initially recorded at the amount by which the purchase price for a business combination exceeds the fair value attributed to the interest in the net fair value of identifiable assets. Inhibities and contingent liabilities at date of acquisition.
